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Chaplain Jake's Corner

The Threat from Within

Using the analogy of the human body, there are some diseases that can spread infection throughout the body of Christ. The mind can become swollen with pride. The heart can grow cold and indifferent because of sin. The digestive system can get clogged by sterile theory and unapplied theology, so the body can't digest what needs to be turned into energy or eliminate what needs to be released. When that occurs we start to fight among ourselves or we lose our equilibrium and find ourselves unable to stay balanced.

Sometimes a dreaded thing occurs in the body – a mutiny – resulting in a tumor... A tumor is called benign if its effect is fairly localized and it stays within membrane boundaries, but the most traumatizing condition in the body occurs when disloyal cells defy inhibition. They multiply without any checks on normal growth, spreading rapidly throughout the body, choking out normal cells. White cells, armed against foreign invaders, will not attack the body's own mutinous cells. Physicians fear no other malfunction more deeply: it is called cancer. For still mysterious reasons, these cells – and they may be cells from the brain, liver, kidney, bone, blood, skin or other tissues – grow wild, out of control. Each is a healthy, functioning cell, but disloyal, no longer acting in regard for the rest of the body.

Even the white blood cells, the dependable palace guard, can destroy the body through rebellion. Sometimes they recklessly reproduce, clogging the bloodstream, overloading the lymph system, strangling the body's normal functions – such as leukemia.

Though I am neither a surgeon nor a prophet, the analogy between cancer in the physical body and mutiny in the spiritual body of Christ seems self-evident. In His warnings to the church, Jesus Christ showed no concern about the shocks and bruises His body would meet from external forces. "The gates of hell shall not prevail against my church," He said flatly (Matthew 16:18). He moved easily, unthreatened, among sinners and criminals. But he cried out against the kind of disloyalty that comes from within.

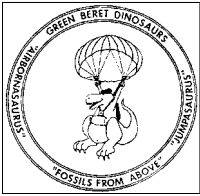
Our Heritage

Detachment "A", Berlin

During August 1956, six modified SFODAs of the 10th SFG stationed at Flint Kaserne Bad Toelz, West Germany, were relocated to West Berlin under the name 7781 Army Unit (also known subsequently as 39th SFOD) and embedded with in HHC, 6th Infantry Regiment, Regimental Headquarters. Each team at that time comprised one Master Sergeant and five team members. Overall officer in charge of the group was a Major, who was assisted by a Captain. On 1 September 1956 the group moved officially to the top floor of Building 1000B at McNair Barracks, West Berlin, under the name of Security Platoon, Regimental HQ, 6th Infantry Regiment.

In April 1958 the unit found its final home in Building 904, Section 2, at Andrews Barracks, West Berlin, and was assigned to HHC, US Army Garrison Berlin – with a new name – Detachment "A" (Det A). In April 1962 was separated from the Garrison and became Detachment "A," Berlin Brigade, US Army Europe (USAREUR), which it remained until its deactivation on 20 December 1984. The balladeers have told us it's a long time from May to September. The ol' Dinosaurs tell us it's a long time from October to January – without lunch that is! We had such a huge hungry herd at the 28 January old soldiers' formation that the American Lake Club had to order emergency rations (Don't they wish). Not all were old soldiers, we had a good showing of active duty troopers and quite a few Dinoettes as well.

Among the group of happy hecklers that we see fairly regular were a couple of SF veterans we don't see near often enough: One, Ernest "Duke" Snider, I met in person for the first time. Of course we all know the Duke from his picture having been recorded for posterity by Jim Donahue in "No Greater Love". Duke is the guy with no pants on as he searches for those little blood-sucking leeches. And the dignified gentleman Duke coaxed from his mountain retreat near Maple Falls was none other than the legendary Larkyn "Rocky" Nesom.

The Rock goes so far back in Special Forces history that only the father of SF, Colonel Aaron Bank could tell us what MSG Nesom's number was on the first 10th Special Forces Group roster. Even then Rocky wore the Silver Star he had earned during World War II. After the Rock whipped the triple volunteers into shape at Bad Tolz he returned to the 77th to get that outfit up to par. Later, he accompanied Colonel "Bull" Simons with the first group to participate in Operation HOTFOOT where Rocky introduced his charges to the exotic and enchanting "Land of a Million Elephants and the White Parasol" known as Laos.

Having walked around the world more than once and shaken every bush twice, the old infantry soldier decided it was time to stack arms and take up flying, so in 1964, the United States Army's NCO Corps lost one of its best and Air America gained a jewel. Rocky spent the long and torturous years of the Southeast Asia conflict flying first as a bundle kicker and later as a pilot.

As with all great warriors, Rocky's feats have become mythical: it is even whispered he visited the incarcerated Colonel Rheault at LBJ with an offer to break him out of jail and fly him out of country. However, those that understand Colonel Rheault know he has too much love and respect for the United States and its Army to have anything but a Socratic belief he should accept whatever judgement his peers might deem necessary. After Saigon fell, Rocky even volunteered to go back in-country to fly a bunch of his old army buddies out who had been working for our government.

I scurried far and wide to find some humorous tales about the Rock, but, nothing I found was printable in a family publication, however, I did get a lot of praise for him though. Ken Hain remarked, "This guy is unique. He used to quote Kipling verse after verse. He could sing, was a great dancer and had a million stories." Rock is very, very independent and although his brother (reported to be quite wealthy) has asked

him to come live with him in Miami, Rocky prefers what he has in Washington: a cabin on a mountain with no electricity, piped in spring water, and chopping his own firewood. Hain concluded, "He is one tough hombre and a man I consider a close friend. They don't make 'em like him any more – he is one of a dying breed in SF and the military."

For humor you will have to ask the Rock about the stolen Rolex watch he once retrieved, and anytime anyone is feeling depressed or deprived of life's creature comforts, you should go visit Rocky, his humming birds and *domesticated* bobcats. You can chop a few sticks of firewood for him and he just might give you a sip of Ol' Crow in return.



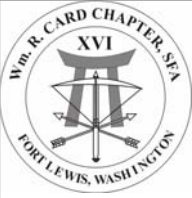
Al Miller announced several new sales items.

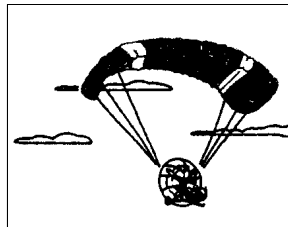


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
